Many psychoanalysts are beginning to realize that the estrangement between their field and academia has been a great misfortune. Dr. Paul will speak about this estrangement and innovative steps Emory University has taken to integrate psychoanalysis into academic life. The panelists will encourage lively discussion about what the university can provide psychoanalysis, as well as what psychoanalysis can give back to academic thought and university life.



Robert Paul, PhD is the Charles Howard Candler Professor of Anthropology and Interdisciplinary Studies at Emory University and was Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences from 2003-2010. He is also Associate Professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences in the Emory School of Medicine.

In 1992, Dean Paul graduated from the Emory University Psychoanalytic Institute. In 1997, he established Emory's widely recognized Psychoanalytic Studies Program. In 2000, he received Emory's Crystal Apple Award for his graduate teaching in that program. He maintains a private clinical practice and holds an appointment as associate professor in the Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences.

Dean Paul has served as editor of *ETHOS: Journal of the Society for Psychological Anthropology* and as president of the Society for Cultural Anthropology. His book, *Moses and Civilization: The Meaning Behind Freud's Myth*, received the Heinz Hartmann Award in Psychoanalysis, the L. Bryce Boyer Award in Psychological Anthropology, and the National Jewish Book Award in the area of Jewish Thought.

1910-2010 Psychoanalysis in North Carolina

1910-Harry Woodburn Chase, the first American translator of Sigmund Freud's lectures at Clark University, joined the UNC-Chapel Hill faculty as Professor of the Philosophy of Education.

1943-Bingham Dai, a native of China who earned a PhD at the University of Chicago and then trained with Harry Stack Sullivan and Karen Horney, joined the Duke faculty as a professor in the School of Medicine's Department of Psychiatry.

1955-The chairs of the Departments of Psychiatry at UNC and Duke, George Ham and Ewald Busse, joined forces to recruit faculty for the UNC-Duke University Psychoanalytic Education Program.

1970- Weston LaBarre, who trained in psychoanalysis at the Menninger Clinic prior to becoming a professor of Anthropology at Duke, published his magnum opus, *The Ghost Dance: Origins of Religion*, a psychoanalytic account of the birth of religion as seen in the ghost dance of native America.

1977-Graduates of the UNC-Duke Psychoanalytic Education Program joined together to form the North Carolina Psychoanalytic Society, a component society of the American Psychoanalytic Association.

1992- The Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy Study Center of North Carolina (PPSC-NC) was established as a component of the North Carolina Psychoanalytic Society.

1995-Six visionary individuals established the North Carolina Psychoanalytic Foundation as a 501(c)(3) charitable organization to advance *psychoanalytic understanding of human mental life and behavior through education and service.*

2008-The Psychoanalytic Education Center of the Carolinas, combining the resources of the PPSC-NC and the Psychoanalytic Institute of the Carolinas, admitted its first students.
